Accelerated Reader

Accelerated Reader is a new program designed to do the following things:

- 1) Find books that are the right ability for your child;
- 2) Encourage your child to read more;
- 3) Improve your child's reading ability.





Two parts to the program



Introduction to the Program







STAR Reading

A computer-adaptive reading test used to assess pupils' reading ability and to determine their recommended reading levels for Accelerated Reader. Measures growth over time.



Accelerated Reader

A database of a quizzes to test comprehension of books read. Provides instant feedback and monitoring.











At the start of this year, pupils across the school took a **Star Test**, which is a computer-based test that measures a student's reading ability through a series of 34 questions.

Every test for every student is different, and the computer selects different questions for each student dependent on how well they answer the previous questions. Essentially, the computer adapts the test to suit your child.






- 1) The student <u>must take their time</u>. It is recommended that each child should spend <u>at least</u> 20 minutes on their tests.
- 2) Students should not guess answers to questions. Instead, they should wait for the question to time out. This is to ensure the computer is not given a false impression of the student's reading ability.
- 3) Tests are done independently.


Picture 1

Fill-in-the-blank questions have a sentence with a word missing. There will also be a list of three or four words that could fit in the blank. Your job is to choose the word that best completes the sentence.



Web browser

Short-answer questions have a text passage at the top, followed by a question about the passage. There will be a list of three or four possible answers. Your job is to choose the best answer to the question.




ZPD score (Zone of Proximal Development)

3.2 - 4.6

After each Star Reading test, children are given a ZPD range, which is two numbers that the pupil uses to choose their next reading book.

The lowest number is the lowest level of book the pupil should be choosing.

The highest number is the highest level of book the pupil should be choosing.

Pupils keep a record of all their ZPDs on their reading log in school.

A new STAR test takes place every term, so students can see improvements in their reading ability.

The library is being set up with colour coded books so that children can easily be self directed when choosing books appropriate to their level.






AR Books and ZPD

ZPD - An individual range of book levels recommended for each pupil's reading ability








How will I know how my child is doing?

You can access your child's AR information in Renaissance Place Home Connect from any webenabled computer.



- Once in the programme, you can view your child's progress towards targets, points and books read.
- You can also access AR BookFinder to search for titles of interest.
- You can only access information about your own child.



Accelerated Reader books

Book Level: The difficulty of text (0.5 - 13.5) Pupils are recommended to read from the beginning of their ZPD

Interest Level: Relates to the content and appropriateness Lower, Middle and Upper Years

Points: Refers to length and the number of words within

a book

Accelerated Reader guizzes

A quiz is taken after a book has been read.

There are usually about 10 multiple choice questions on the book. At the end of the quiz the pupils are given a percentage to show them how well they have done. Generally they need a pass rate of 60% or higher to earn the points, but children are encouraged to aim for a pass mark of 85%, which shows deeper understanding.

Points are based on pro rata basis depending on how well they do on their reading comprehension quiz.

Some vocabulary practice quizzes can be taken as well.

There are some important rules for taking quizzes:


- 1) The quiz should take place at school, preferably within 24 hours of finishing the book if possible.
- 2) A student cannot take a quiz until they have read the entire text.
- 3) Quizzes must be done individually, not with anyone's help.

"How much should my child read each day?"

 According to Renaissance Learning's research, children who read <u>at least</u> 20 minutes a day with a 90% comprehension rate on AR quizzes see the greatest gains.

 Your child should have <u>at least</u> 20 minutes set aside for reading during day.





"How can I help?"

- As with anything, performance improves with practice.
- Encourage your child to read at home.
- Create a culture of reading in your household by reading with your child, starting a home library, visiting your local library, charity shop or bookshop on a regular basis and by letting your child see you reading.
- When reading with your child stop and ask questions to be sure your child comprehends what they have read and in general make a habit of discussing books that each of you has read.


