- No.
- Children cannot fail them.
- Results get passed on to secondary school, but teacher assessment is more accurate and useful.
- They don't affect any future options.

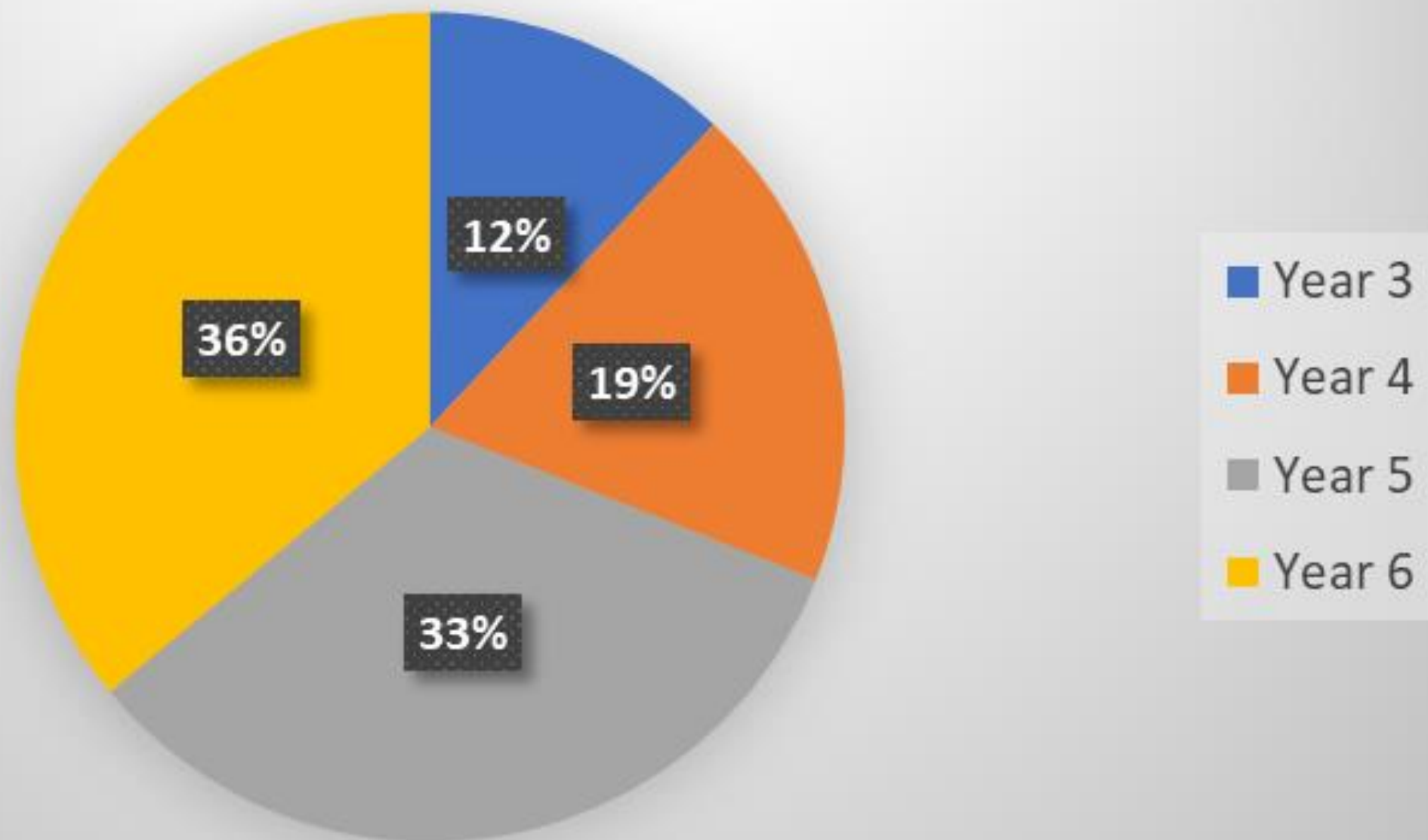

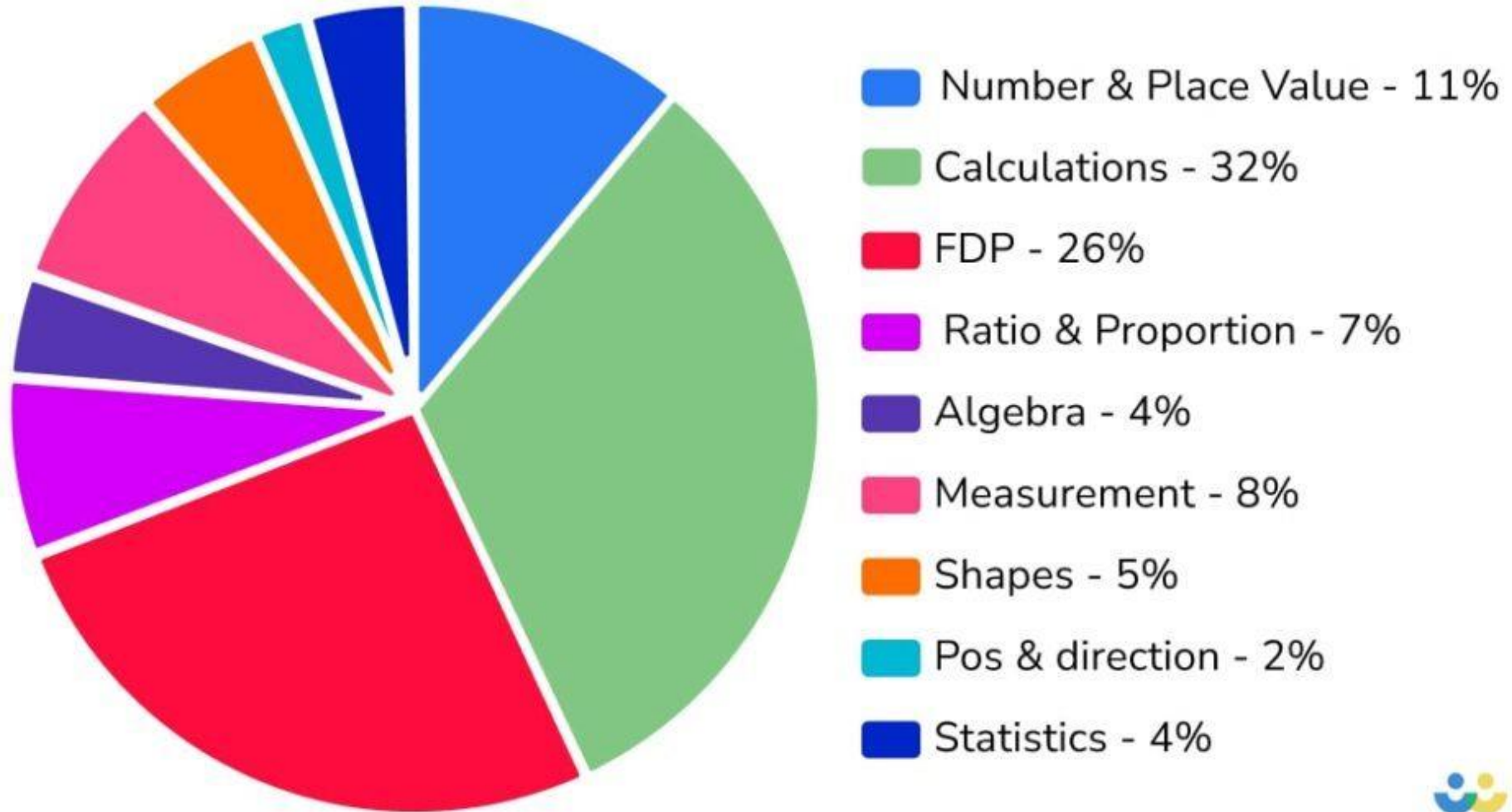


Year group coverage in 2023 maths papers

Maths - arithmetic paper



- * Arithmetic test - 30 mins, 36 questions.
Include complex calculations with fractions.
- * Gets progressively more difficult.
- * For complex calculations, marks awarded for choosing and using a correct method, even if an answer is wrong.

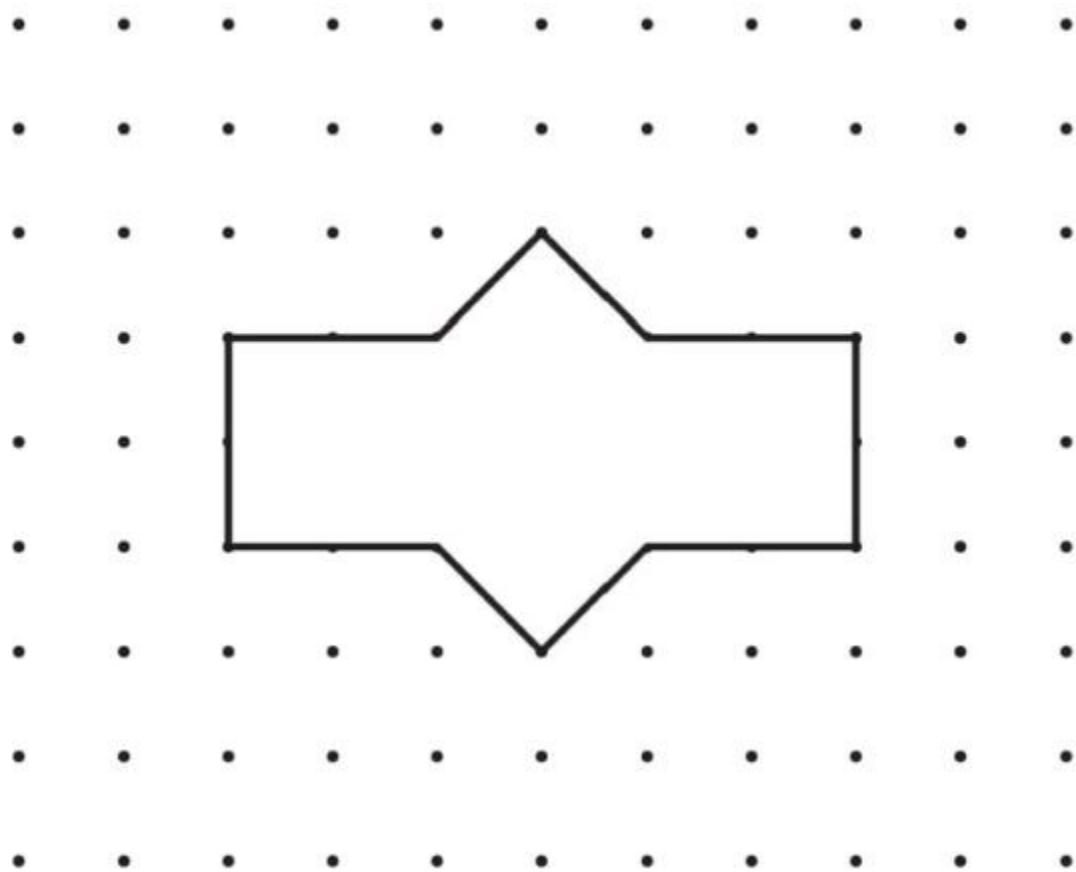

Reading

- The children have to answer questions on three separate texts.
- Children are expected to use the text to find evidence (retrieval) - 32% of questions last year.
- Some questions ask for the children to give their opinions and justify it (inference) - 46% of questions last year.
- Some questions ask about the meaning and choice of words - 18% of questions last year.

SPAG (Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar)

- Children's raw score will be converted to a scaled score between 80-120.
- National standard is a scaled score of 100 (AS).
- Children who get a scaled score below 100 are judged to not be meeting age-expected standard (NS).
- Children who get a scaled score of 110+ are judged to be working at a Greater Depth standard (GDS).

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Is there any support available in the tests?

- 4 types of support:
Additional time
Scribe
Reader
Prompter
- Additional time is only given for children on an EHCP or 'if pupils have difficulty processing information'



Is there any support available in the tests?



Additional time

'require additional time under test conditions to properly demonstrate their knowledge and understanding; this may include pupils who are unable to work at the same speed as their peers due to a specific need'

Reader

'these pupils will have a reading age that is considerably lower than their actual age.'

Scribe

use of a scribe reflects normal classroom practice.

Prompter

A pupil who is unable to focus independently, or who loses concentration easily, may be supported by someone known to them who can keep them on task.



How are we preparing the children?

- Covering the curriculum
- No pressure about the tests.
- Half-termly test week to practise and get used to test papers.
- The tests on week beg. 11th March 2024 will replicate SATs week, including levels of support and location.
- These results and levels of support will be shared with you at parents evening.

How can you support your child?



- Continue with regular reading. Practise locating information quickly in a text.
- Times table practice.
- Practise weekly spellings and revisit previous ones regularly.
- SATs Buster books

How can you support your child in test week?

- The reality that SATs are just one week of your child's life.
- Ensure your child is in school on time.
- Ensure your child has had a good sleep, away from night time technology.
- Ensure your child has had a hearty breakfast.
- Additional snacks for break
- Doing your best is good enough.
